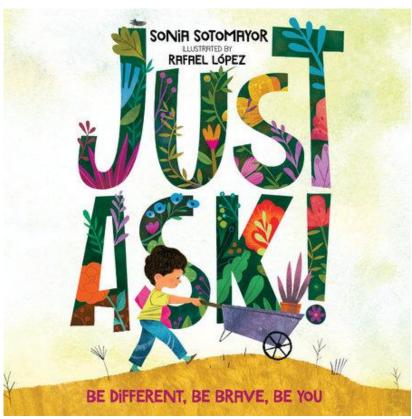

The ADA is a civil rights law. Its purpose is to "make sure that people with disabilities have the same rights and opportunities as everyone else." (adata.org)

## **Types of Disability**

## **Simplified Types of Disability:**

- Intellectual/Developmental Impacts how someone's body, mind, and/or emotions develop
- Physical/Motility
   Impacts a person's ability to move around or use different parts of their body
- Sensory Impaired
   Impacts a person's ability to use one or more of their senses
- Invisible (Chronic Illness)
   A disability that others might not be able to see or notice, but that has a major impact on a person's life and health
- Psychiatric
   A mental illness or impairment
- Neurological Impacts a person's brain and/or nervous system

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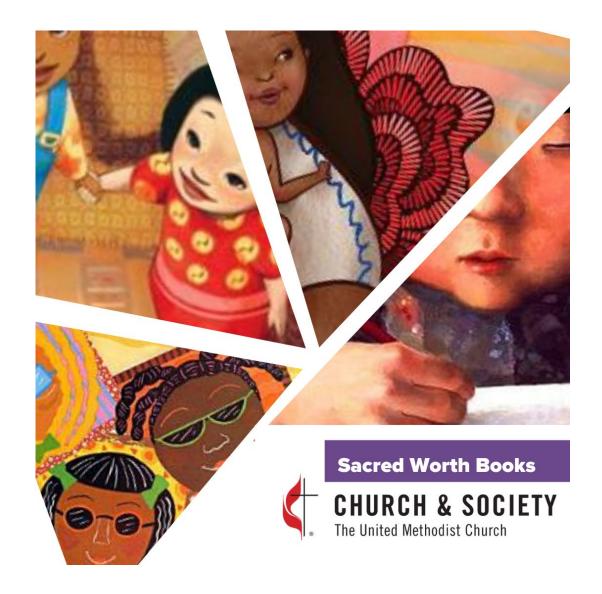
